# A Recap of *Nourishing Nations Roundtable* Community Resources Event for Indigenous Food Sovereignty

The NCIAF recently held a dynamic event focused on empowering Indigenous community leaders to build networks and learn together. The *Nourishing Nations Roundtable* highlighted NCIAF-supported and Indigenous-led projects and food systems related to gardens, orchards, and greenhouses.

The gathering offered a space to share opportunities, success stories, and key insights from each area.

The day was spent exploring resources to establish and expand these projects, community garden and orchard leaders shared their journeys and provincial experts offered practical knowledge, strategies, and support options for building resilient food systems.



Feedback from attendees showed a strong interest in bringing these efforts to more communities, underscoring the rising demand for food production initiatives that unite youth and elders across Indigenous lands. Many attendees found the experience transformative, with shared stories fostering a sense of unity and purpose.

This event marked a positive step towards building a sustainable, Indigenous-led agricultural future. NCIAF looks forward to organizing similar events and fostering the partnerships and connections that drive food security and sovereignty for Indigenous communities.

This partnership will give Indigenous communities access to new funding opportunities, specialized services, and sustainable practices that support food security and economic resilience.

# Co-designing the Future: NIAP Advisory Circle Shapes Indigenous Agriculture Programs



The National Indigenous Agriculture Program (NIAP) Advisory Circle was created to guide and advise the development of NCIAF programming. Consisting of Indigenous and non-Indigenous individuals who bring diverse agricultural and agribusiness experiences and knowledge from across Canada, the NIAP Advisory Circle will focus on youth education, training opportunities, local food system development, and community garden/food sovereignty initiatives.

On October 31st, the NIAP Advisory Circle met for the first time. The meeting was spent updating the members on what NCIAF has delivered to date, the development of the NIAP framework, and discussing what is on the programming horizon. With the Advisory Circle's wisdom, enthusiasm and direction, the NCIAF will be delivering its first program focused

agricultural food systems and cooking classes into First Nations communities. This program, titled Nourishing Nations Empowering Generations, will be co-designed directly with community. This custom approach was developed with the intention of providing flexible and tailored solutions to meet the unique needs of each individual nation. Next steps will include a pilot program in the 2025 growing season.

## NCIAF Presence Goes International at the Tri-National Accord

In October, NCIAF's Senior Vice President of Business Development attended the Tri-National Agricultural Accord which exemplifies a valuable collaborative approach for advancing agricultural trade and rural development across North America.

Chris had the opportunity to present the goals and objectives of the National Circle for Indigenous Agriculture and Food and shared how this partnership offers an essential platform to ensure that Indigenous voices are included in discussions on agricultural policy and trade decisions impacting Indigenous communities across Canada and North America.

This commitment to working together started with a U.S.-Canada agreement in 1984, which expanded to include Mexico with the creation of NAFTA in the early 1990's and has continued ABOUT THE NCIAS

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through annual trilateral meetings since 1992. Today, under the U.S.-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA), the Accord strengthens opportunities for Indigenous food producers to access broader North American and global markets.



To fully realize the benefits of these agreements, Indigenous representation is vital. The Accord's consultative structure allows Indigenous agricultural leaders, through the Circle, to provide valuable input to provincial and federal officials.

Each year, provincial and state representatives gather as delegates to the Tri-National Agricultural Accord, where the Circle plays a key role in advocating for Indigenous agriculture and food systems.

# **Building Strength from Within: Meet Our Director of Capacity Development**


