

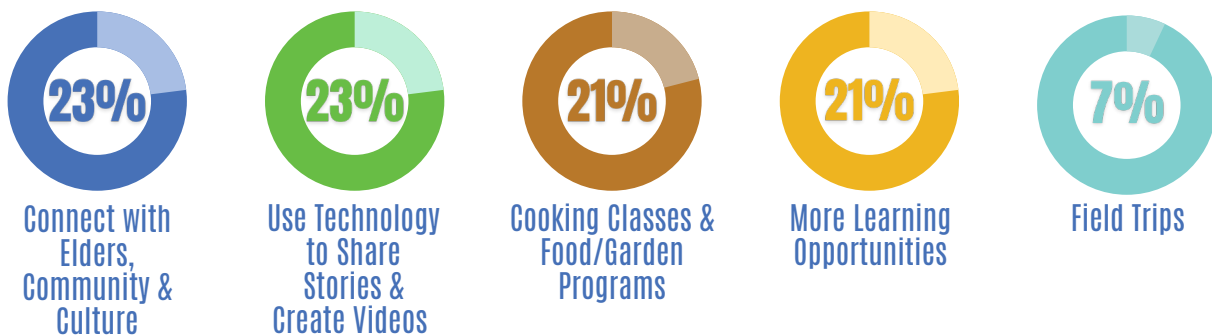
# WO ININA 2025 What We Heard

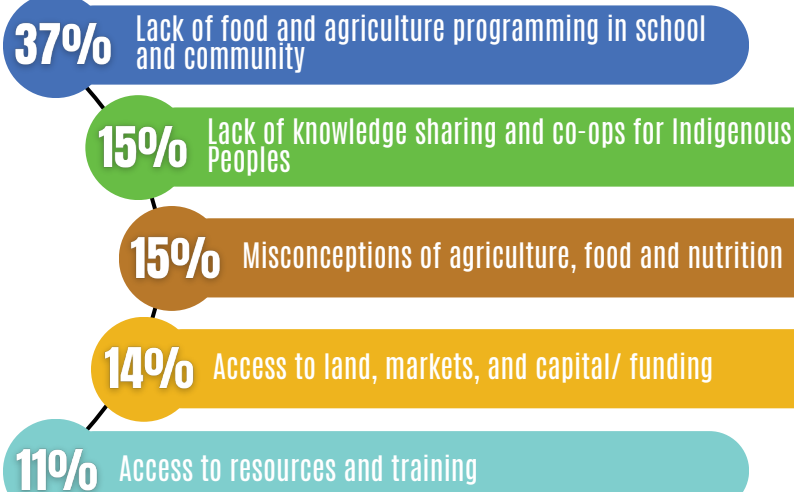
## What types of hands on activities would most effectively engage youth in food-related initiatives?



## How can we engage youth in learning, preserving, and sharing both traditional and modern food ways?

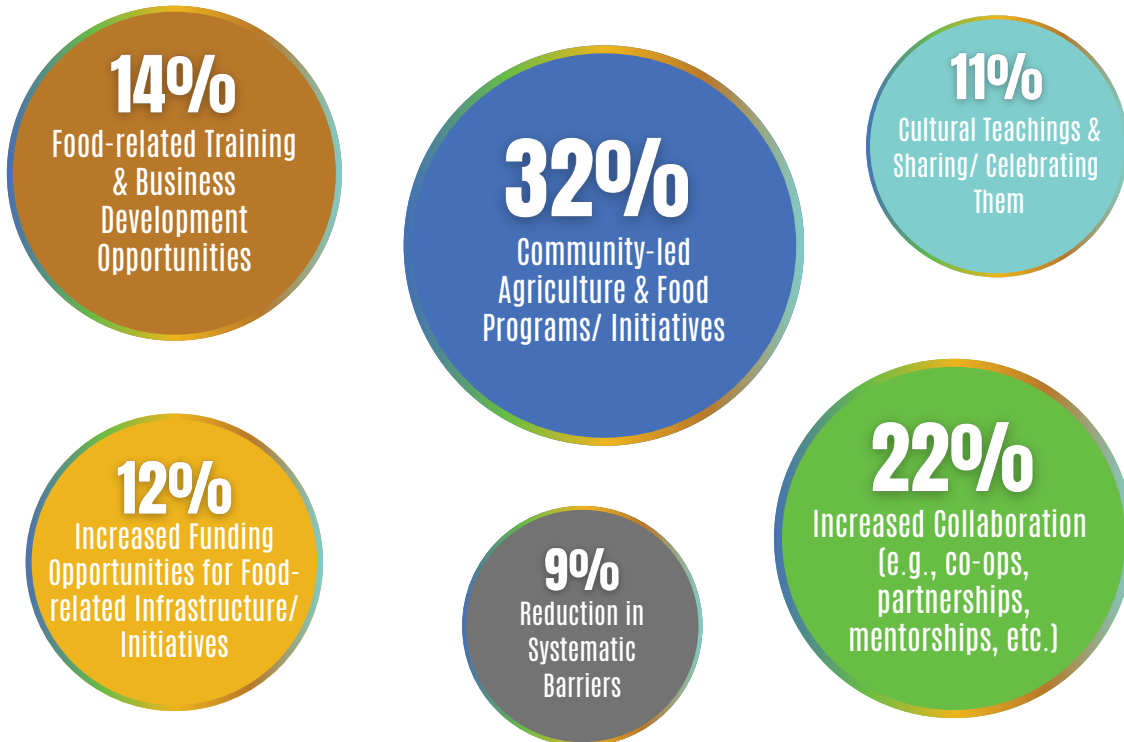


## What existing barriers can we tackle to get youth back into food and agriculture?
